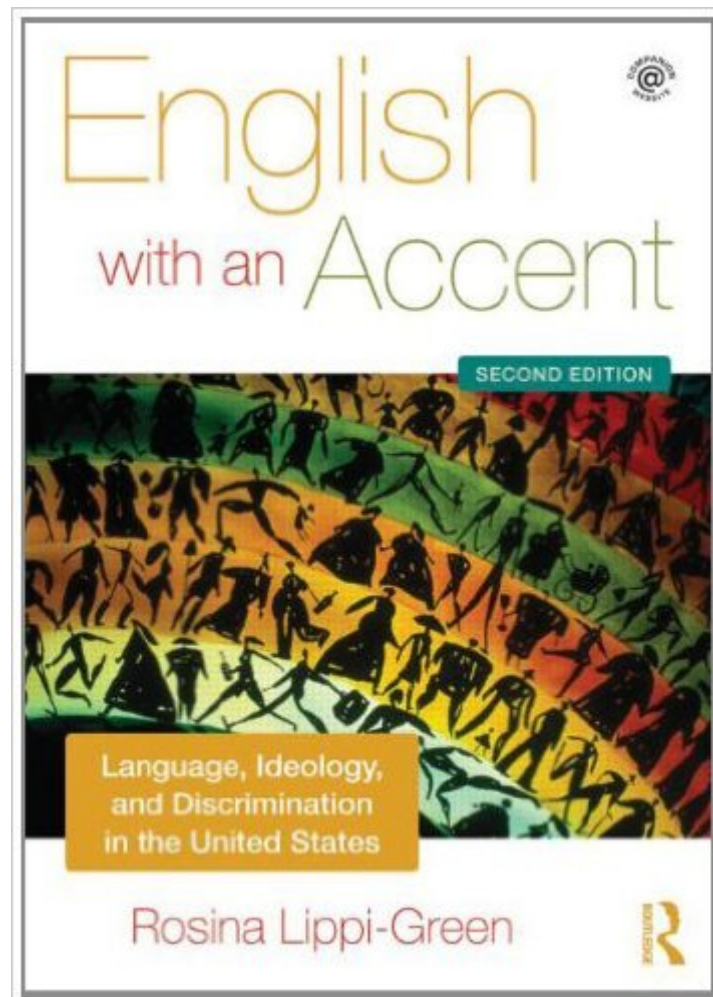


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# English With An Accent: Language, Ideology And Discrimination In The United States
