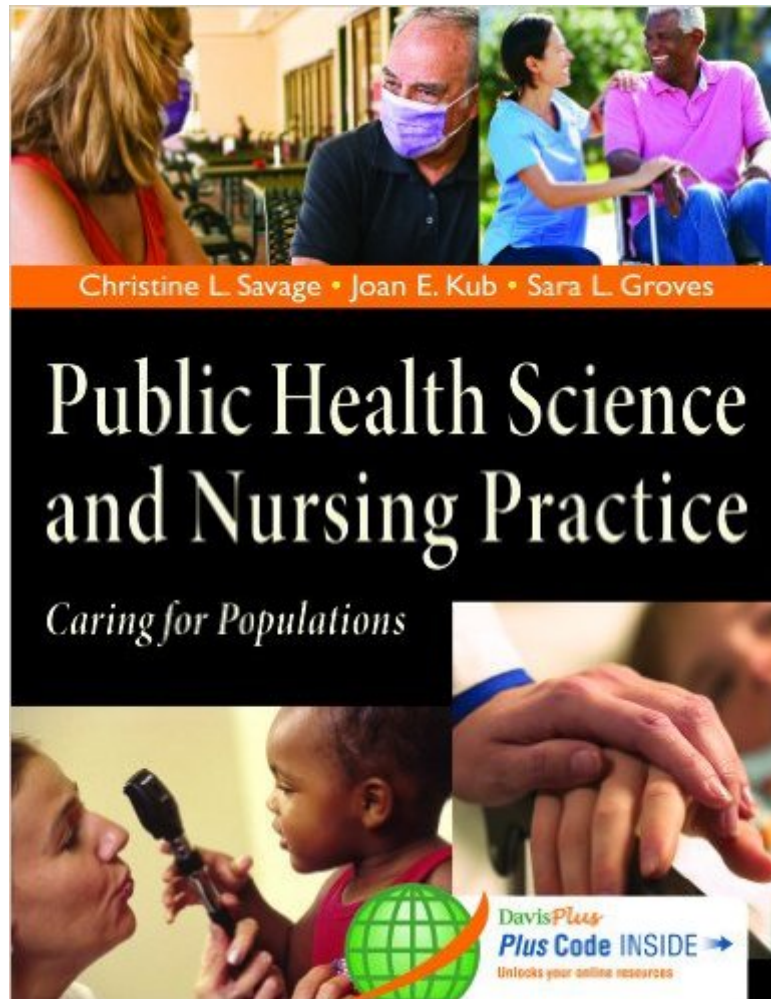


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# Public Health Science And Nursing Practice: Caring For Populations

Unfortunately for me, not only do I have to read the book, I also have to take the online quizzes which accompany the book. If you are an instructor reading this review in order to decide whether to use this book for a class, please, do your students a huge favor and pick any book but this one! Yes there are typos in the book, yes there are mistakes (i.e. interdependent is not the same as independent)! As far as the online quizzes go, the mistakes are so numerous that it is impossible to list all of them. What is keyed as the correct answer and the explanation for it do not match! The authors are affiliated with Johns Hopkins University which surprised me greatly because the book is just so poorly done!

This book has a lot of information about public health practices and public health nursing. It covers a variety of topics from epidemiology to global health to occupational health. The text also includes

case studies to help illustrate public health nursing practice in action and provide "real life examples." It is a wonderful introduction to the complex and diverse practice of public health science and practice.
